A selection of works of the major novelists will be submitted to students in-depth research projects.

<u>5-Poetry: (08814103)</u>

Course Objectives:

The course focuses on the major characteristics of the 19th century and 20th century poetry. Close attention will be directed to the impact of other forms of art such as sculpture and painting on the major poetic production of the age.
